

COURSE DETAILS – 3 DAYS/LONG WEEKEND 3D0158

TITLE: SMALL STONE CARVINGS IN ALABASTER AND SOAPSTONE

TUTOR: PAULA HAUGHNEY

LEVEL: SUITABLE FOR ALL

GENERAL CONTENT OF COURSE:

This course is for complete beginners, for people who feel physically unable to tackle a large sculpture, or those who would just like to work small. It is an introduction to the properties of stone and to creating three-dimensional objects.

On the first evening, a short slide show is given and then work begins on a very small piece of stone or a piece of soap.

Books and pictures illustrating Inuit, Japanese and Chinese sculptures are available to inspire.

Working with soft stones, soapstone and alabaster, a small sculpture up to 15 cm high is formed using rifflers and rasps. There is some carving with a mallet and chisel. It is then smoothed, oiled and waxed. By the end of the course the students are able to finish one or more small sculptures.

Look for ideas and inspiration – pictures that interest, figurative, animals, abstract – but keep in mind it has to be simple: solid, rounded shapes are best for beginners. The stone often suggests shapes and it is easier to adjust the idea than the stone. There is a selection of small pieces cut ready for use and advice is given on the qualities of the different stones.

Carving is a dusty activity but can be done sitting down. Tools are provided by the College. Advice on protective clothing is given by the tutor and some items and equipment may be borrowed from the College workshop.

Health and Safety: The tutor instructs students in health and safety issues relevant to this course. Students may work unsupervised on agreed projects once they have satisfied the tutor as to their competence. There may be restrictions on the equipment available to students in the tutor's absence. **Eye protection and face masks are essential. These are supplied in the workshop. Your tutor will advise you.**

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MATERIALS FOR THE COURSE:

Stone: A variety of stone will be available and can be bought through the College Shop. Prices depend on the weight and are currently around £2 – £3 per kilo (£1.50 per lb). For example, a piece of Ancaster stone 12" x 12" x 12" (50kg) @ £2.70 per kilo would cost £135 at today's prices. (These prices may have to change without notice if subsequent deliveries are obtained at higher prices.) Most pieces of soapstone average out about £5.
